The Economic Opportunity Commission of Nassau County, Inc. (EOC) is a 501 (c) (3) Community Action Agency born out of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 which was signed into law by President Lyndon Johnson on August 20, 1964. A signature legislation of Johnson's, "War on Poverty," the Act provided, among other things created a Job Corps to train youth, encouraged community action programs, and provided for the establishment of the Head Start program. The EOC of Nassau County, Inc. was initially constituted as a program of the Health and Welfare Council of Long Island. Ten neighborhood centers were developed and fully staffed. Five years later, the EOC of Nassau County, Inc. was incorporated, separated, and completely independent of the Health and Welfare Council.

For nearly 50 years the EOC of Nassau County, Inc. has provided programs and services to low-income Nassau County residents. During the past year, approximately 41,000 unduplicated low-income children, youth, individuals, and families accessed EOC of Nassau County, Inc. programs and services. As a Community Action Agency, the EOC of Nassau County, Inc. is a direct support for the County's residents who live at or below the federal poverty level. This includes those are recognized as, "working poor."

As such, the EOC of Nassau County, Inc. is the designated anti-poverty agency in Nassau County, New York. It is devoted to facilitating and strengthening basic social relationships between individuals, families, and social organizations in Nassau County. Our motto is, "Helping People. Changing Lives."

Long Beach Head Start Rebuild

The devastation of Hurricane Sandy in October 2012, impacted 60 children enrolled in the EOC Long Beach Head Start Program. After months of contract negotiations led by the EOC Chief Executive Officer, EOC Comptroller and EOC Head Start Director, with representatives of the Administration for Children and Families, the EOC was granted a \$7 million grant (100% funded) to rebuild the Long Beach Head Start Program. The design for the new building was created by Universal Design and Construction Management, a minority owned and operated business located in Baldwin, New York. Construction on the state-of-the-art building began in August 2014 and has been designed to accommodate an expanded enrollment of children and families.

On August 8, 2014, the EOC released it's past with the demolition of the Long Beach Head Start facility. We embraced our future with a groundbreaking ceremony led by Ms. Iris A. Johnson, EOC Chief Executive Officer and attended by the EOC Board Members, Head Start Federal and Regional Staff, City of Long Beach Officials, EOC Staff, Long Beach Head Start parents, children and other community residents.


A Message From the Chief Executive Officer..



School Readiness Goals

School readiness gives a broad picture of a child's abilities and behaviors that are observed over a period in a variety of contexts. It takes into consideration the child's growth over time as a continuum of progress. Children are not pressured to obtain the necessary skills through short goals, but are engaged in long-term goals of motivation, curiosity, independence, and taking initiative. Learning for school readiness is obtained through play and multi-sensory experiences. Our Head Start Domain helps us to prepare our children for kindergarten. These essential domains include social/emotional, language/literacy, approaches to learning, cognition and general knowledge, and physical well-being and motor development. Children leaving our center-based and home-based programs and entering the public school system are equipped with the following skills, which provide them with a solid foundation for success in the public school system. These established skills are aligned with the Head Start Child Outcomes Framework and are shared expectations for children's learning and development as they transition to school. These skills are obtained through the incorporation of the Creative Curriculum for our centerbased programs and individualized learning based on the needs and interests of the children for our home-based program.

Social and Emotional Goals

- Children will engage in and maintain positive relationships and interactions with trusted adults.
- Children will recognize the differences and similarities in all humans.
- Children will be able to demonstrate cooperation and respect.
- Children will engage in and maintain positive peer relationships and interactions.
- Children will regulate own emotions and behaviors and respond to emotional cues.
- Children will learn and follow classroom rules, routines, and directions.
- Children will participate in group activities to help them develop a sense of belonging and responsibility to their peers, family, and community.
- Children will be able to use words during confrontations instead of physical actions.
- Children will be able to verbally express their emotions.
- Children will be able to ask an adult for help and solve social problems.



- Children will be able to balance needs and rights of self and others.
- Children will be able to take care of own needs appropriately.

Language and Literacy Goals

- Children will build, use, and comprehend increasingly complex and varied vocabulary.
- Children will be able to use language to express thoughts and needs.
- Children will be able to use conventional grammar.
- Children will be able to use appropriate conversational and other communication skills.
- Children will be able to engage in conversation with peers and trusted adults.
- Children will be able to demonstrate phonological awareness.
- Children will identify, name, and use letter sound knowledge.
- Children will be able to orient books correctly; turning pages from the front of the book to the back and recognize familiar books by their covers.
- Children will be able to understand the job of an author and an illustrator.
- Children will be able to respond to literature and partake in the reading of familiar stories with repetitive language.
- Children will be able to visualize or picture what is happening in the text by retelling, illustrating and questioning.
- Children will be able to share personal experiences.
- Children will be able to recognize print and write to convey meaning.
- Children will be able to write first and last name.

English Language Development

- Children will use expressive and receptive English language skills.
- Children will engage in English literacy activities.

Approaches to Learning

- Children will demonstrate persistence when working with materials and activities.
- Children will show eagerness to learn and display interest in various topics and activities.
- Children will demonstrate fairness and courtesy.
- Children will learn and make connections to prior knowledge.
- Children will show curiosity and motivation.
- Children will be able to distinguish letters from numbers.

School Readiness Goals (continued)

Cognition and General Knowledge Goals

- Children will use observations, ask questions, and make predictions to gain better understanding of information and activities in their surroundings.
- Children will name the days of the week and the months of the year.
- Children will understand the concept of yesterday, today, and tomorrow.
- Children will use their skills in retaining information and show flexibility and inventiveness in thinking.
- Children will know how to use their imagination to pretend play with their peers.
- Children will show curiosity and motivation.
- Children will use classification skills.
- Children will engage in socio-dramatic play.
- Children will be able to draw a picture and describe their picture to their peers and adults (thinking symbolically).

Physical Well-Being and Motor Development Goals

- Children will exercise and participate in other physical fitness activities daily.
- Children will perform basic gross motor skills such as walking, running, jumping, skipping, hopping, and galloping.
- Children will demonstrate fine-motor strength and coordination (using a three-point finger grip and efficient hand placement when manipulating writing and drawing tools.)
- Children will demonstrate fairness and courtesy.
- Children will be able to follow the rules of a game/activity.
- Children will follow safety rules during playtime.
- Children will understand the importance of grooming and hygiene.
- Children will understand the importance of eating healthy.
- Children will know the reasons why they need to visit their doctor, and dentist.
- Children will know how to dress and undress themselves.
- Children will demonstrate proper hand washing.

Mathematics

- Children will use number concepts and symbols.
- Children will be able to count, quantify, and connect numerals with their quantities.
- Children will explore and describe spatial relationships and shapes.
- Children will compare and measure.
- Children will create simple patterns.

Science and Technology

- Children will use scientific inquiry skills
- Children will demonstrate knowledge of the characteristics of living things.
- Children will demonstrate knowledge of Earth's environment.
- Children will use tools and technology to perform tasks (including hatch computers and smart board)
- Children will identify the five senses and the organ that is used for each sense.

Social Studies

- Children will demonstrate knowledge about self.
- Children will show basic understanding of people and how they live.
- Children will demonstrate simple geographic knowledge.
- Children will understand that their family is a part of a larger community.
- Children will understand the roles of various community helpers.
- Children will recognize the different types of family units.

Creative Arts and Expression

- Children will explore the visual arts.
- Children will explore musical concepts.
- Children will explore dance and movement concepts.
- Children will explore drama using their imagination to pretend play.

Parent Involvement



EOC Head Start fosters he role of parents as the primary educators and nurturers, and advocates for their children. Therefore, EOC Head Start works in close partnership with parents to assist them in developing and utilizing individual and family strengths in order to successfully meet personal and family objectives. Parents are encouraged to become involved in all aspects of the program, from participation in children's activities to direct involvement in policy and program decisions.

Head Start services are also family-centered, following the tenets that children develop in the context of their family and culture and that parents are respected as the primary educators and nurtures of their children. Head Start offers family members opportunities and support for growth and change, believing that people can identify their own strengths, needs, and interests are capable of finding solutions.

Transitioning to Kindergarten



In order to comply with Head Start Performance Standards, Section 642(A). EOC's Head Start children begin preparing for their transition to kindergarten from day one. EOC recognizes the importance of a smooth transition. We understand that parental involvement is a critical piece of the process. Throughout the school year, 6 critical steps are enlisted to promote a successful and smooth transition for children and families as they move into the early childhood experience.


The children of the EOC enjoy the amenities of the facility and services which are provided by the program. Children enjoyed "Bubbles and Air" and "Sounds Everywhere" which were provided by Mad Science, an imaginative and interactive workshop geared toward science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) learning experiences for children.





EOC Head Start Training Institute

The EOC of Nassau County, Inc., Head Start Child Development Program implements ongoing training and technical assistance through the modality of the EOC Head Start Training Institute. The EOC Head Start Training Institute (a vision of Chief Executive Officer) was established at the commencement of the 2013-2014 program year and has proven to be an innovative, effective and intensive foundation for successful implementation of professional staff development for key management staff, management staff at all levels and frontline staff. Throughout the 2014-2015 Program Year; Head Start program staff participated in direct and cross-training in the following areas; Management and Supervision; Early Childhood Development/Education, Environmental Health and Safety, Nutrition, Transportation, Family and Community Partnerships/ Parent Involvement, Health and Safety, Disabilities, Mental Health and Human Resources. A total of 110 training sessions were conducted, constituting 300.20 hours of staff professional development training. Subsequent evaluation of training sessions (implementation, direct observation of program activities/ services provided and program data) will be used to assess what we need to continue, what we do more of, and what areas need to be modified. One of our main goals in preparing children for school readiness includes; improving overall program quality and obtaining additional training on the Classroom Assessment Scoring System (CLASS) for 100% of staff and measurably improving our overall CLASS scores. Our CLASS goals are: 1) By June 2016, Head Start Lead Teachers will have improved in the implementation of CLASS Instructional Support by 30%. This will ensure that teachers are, implementing the curriculum effectively, promoting cognitive and language development, encouraging children's reasoning abilities, conversational and vocabulary skills. 2. By June 2016, increase the number of staff that have developed pathways towards completion of successful careers in early childhood education. 3. By March 2015, increase the number of EOC Head Start supervisory staff that are trained as CLASS observers.



Maternal and Infant Community Health Collaborative (New Initiative)

Maternal and Infant Community Health Collaborative (MICHC) is a New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) funded initiative to improve health outcomes for women of childbearing age and their families. The goals of MICHC are to improve women's health during their childbearing years, including maternal and infant health outcomes.

We focus on building systems of care for women in the three life stages of:


- Preconception (before pregnancy)
- Prenatal/Postpartum (during and after pregnancy)
- Inter-conception (between pregnancies)

Working with community partners, EOC will assess and prioritize specific community needs and implement strategies to address and improve these needs. Community Health Workers are available to assist high-need women access and navigate healthcare and other essential support services, conduct home visiting, and provide group and individual education.





Office for New Americans





Raissa and Shelton Munlin, partners, SJR Security Consultants attended the Office for New Americans "Starting a Small Business Series" Workshop on December 15, 2014. EOC's youth development programs focus on youth of all ages. A Comprehensive year round program is offered which includes participation in local Youth Councils and a County-Wide Youth Council.
